OneTogether is inviting health care professionals to enter its annual Small Steps Award. The Small Steps Award has been designed to recognise, celebrate and share best practice in reducing the risk of surgical site infections (SSIs).



I would encourage anyone who has helped to improve surgical care and reduce the risk of surgical site infections to enter; whether these actions are big or small."

The team at OneTogether is especially encouraging entries from individuals who have made small changes to improve the care of patients undergoing surgery. Tracey Radcliffe, the RCN representative for OneTogether and President of BARNA added, "Many clinicians who make a big difference to improving surgical patient care go widely unnoticed. We want to hear from these people, and share their success stories with our community."

The Small Steps Award recognises an individual or teams that have made small changes in practice to improve surgical care and reduce the risk of SSI.

To enter, applicants should visit the OneTogether website at www.onetogether.org.uk and complete the entry form. The closing date for entries is 1 September 2019.

OneTogether Small Steps Award scoring criteria

Each question is scored individually and given a rating between satisfactory, good and excellent ratings. Guidelines are provided below to describe characteristics of a programme that would fall at low, mid, and high ratings on the scale. A total of 500 points are available, and the point allocation for each question is indicated in the scoring table below.

Terms and conditions

- 1 Entry is open to healthcare practitioners in the United Kingdom & Ireland. All entries must be submitted in English.
- 2 The entrant/entrant's team must have worked on the activity that is featured in the entry.
- 3 The deadline for entries is 1 September 2019. All entrants will be notified on the outcome of their application by 4 October 2019.
- 4 The Awards are judged by the representatives from each of the OneTogether partner associations. A list of representatives can be found at www.onetogether.org.uk/about/meet-the-board
- 5 Any entries received which do not complete the entry form in full, will be disqualified.
- 6 No feedback will be given on individual entries. In all matters, the decision of the judges shall be final.
- 7 Winners will be notified by 25 September 2019.
- 8 Winning entrants will be awarded at the OneTogether Expert Conference 2019 on 7 November 2019.
- 9 The winning entrant's details will be engraved on the OneTogether Award trophy. All significant contributors will receive a framed certificate.
- 10 All entries may be added to the OneTogether website to help raise awareness of best practice examples across the health care community. Entries may be subject to editing. Entrants can request that their hospital and contact information is not published by selecting this option on the entry form.
- 11 By entering the OneTogether Small Steps Award, entrants agree to be bound by the terms and conditions of entry.
